Dear Alex

I am writing regarding the deportation of Roksana Lecka under the Early Removal Scheme (ERS) for Foreign National Offenders (FNOs), on behalf of her victims' families to request an urgent call.

On Friday 30th January 2026, the parents of the children abused by Lecka were informed that she would be deported to Poland on 5th February 2026, this coming Thursday. Despite being eligible for deportation since 7th October 2025, it was only at 5pm on Friday, that the parents were given a week's notice that she would be deported.

For background, Polish national Roksana Lecka was convicted of 21 counts of cruelty to a person under the age of 16 and sentenced to eight years in jail on 26th September 2025. Lecka admitted to seven counts of cruelty to a person under the age of 16 and was convicted of a further 14 counts. CCTV footage showed Lecka carrying out multiple assaults on the children in her care which included repeatedly pinching and grabbing children, dropping babies into their cots and on one occasion, she delivered several kicks to a young boy to the face and stepped on his shoulder. Her crimes were discovered in June 2024 after she was sent home for pinching a number of children at Riverside Nursery in Twickenham. Parents had been raising concerns about unexplained bruises and distress amongst their children since March 2024.

It is my understanding that under the government's ERS for FNOs, those who are serving fixed term prison sentences of longer than 12 months are considered for mandatory deportation, and Lecka's deportation was approved by the Home Office. Following an amendment to the legislation in June 2025, foreign offenders became eligible for deportation after serving 30% of their sentence, and therefore Lecka became eligible for deportation on 7th October 2025.

This case, which attracted significant media attention during the course of the trial and sentencing due to the nature of the crimes, raises questions around redress and justice for victims, as well as safeguarding.

Lecka was refused bail on multiple occasions during her period in pre-trial custody, identified as a flight risk and a risk to the public based on the alleged offences. The concern was she would flee to Poland, and now after all this time, pain, the vast expense and emotional trauma of the investigation, trial and sentencing, for the parents, it has effectively ended up at the same point.

This is especially worrying for parents who now fear Lecka will be set free on arrival in Poland, potentially left to abuse children in Poland, or even try and make her way back to the UK through irregular means. It has not even been made clear as to whether it will be ensured that Lecka can never work with children and young people again.

The parents have described Lecka as a “huge threat to society” and believe there is a significant risk of her re-offending and of children, whether in Poland or elsewhere, coming to harm at her hands. They feel that all they have as victims is the verdict and the notion of a sentence, and that justice has in this case sadly not been done.

These are important public policy questions that need to be addressed regarding the criteria and terms of release for foreign offenders such as Lecka. It is vital that the victims of this crime are not forgotten, and that we work together to ensure justice is done, and that Lecka is never able to commit crimes like these to any child, regardless of nationality, ever again.

Therefore, I would be grateful if you would be able to urgently provide answers to the following questions from the parents of Lecka’s victims over a call **before Thursday**:

- What are the terms of Lecka’s removal?
- Will Lecka be imprisoned, serve any form of probation or be subject to supervision in Poland, or will she be able to walk free?
- Will Lecka be placed on a safeguarding list that bars her from working with children?
